

Opening School 2022-2023 Plan

Presented to the Board of Education August 15, 2022

GOAL

Keep all students, in person, every day in the safest environment possible.

To reach that goal, the District will continue to follow guidance from the leading public health agencies, as it has done throughout the pandemic. The District will utilize existing and emerging avenues available to keep students in school and will continually monitor the migration to an endemic environment.

Health & Safety Protocols

Updated CDC Guidance

D34 Will Follow CDC's Streamlined Guidance Released August 11, 2022



What's Changed?

- **Testing:** No SHIELD testing (screening of healthy individuals not recommended by CDC)
- **Masking:** Optional for all staff, with exception of in the health office
- Lunch Protocols: Return to pre-pandemic schedules/setup
- Volunteers: Welcome in classrooms/at school events
- Performances: Musical and stage performances return

What Remains the Same?

- Masking: Required in health offices, and on days 6-10 when returning after positive test
- Notification:
 - Report known positive cases to CCDPH
 - Family notification of positive cases sent to classroom (PK-2), grade-level (3-8)
- Vaccination: Not required; District will share vaccine/booster opportunities
- Optional Testing: Ravinia Health kits available
- **Remote Learning:** Grade Center Teachers (K-2, 3-5, 6-8, with one-way Zoom available 6-8) for those out for COVID-19
- Health Office Staff: Building & District RNs
- **Hygiene:** Reminders/reinforcement
- Cleaning/Sanitizing continues
- **Ventilation:** 50% outside air, MERV filters

Key Component: Rapid Antigen Testing

Keep Healthy Students in School with as Little Disruption & Interruption as Possible

Students and staff who develop new symptoms at school from no known existing condition can take a **rapid antigen test** in the school health office. If the test is negative, the person can immediately return to the classroom/work.

The District encourages parents to opt into to rapid antigen testing to facilitate a quick return to class.
